PROVISIONAL AWARD

First, I want to thank to the Tourney Director José Miguel Quesada for the great support in the preparation of the studies which were forwarded in increasing order of material and in anonymous form. In total, I received 60 compositions (58 originals + 2 versions) in pgn format of 44 composers of 20 countries what can be considered as a success of participation.

Now, some short words about the celebrant. It can be said that Joaquín was the person who encouraged me to compose studies just 20 years ago in 1997 when he was the editor of the endgame study column of the disappeared Spanish magazine OchoxOcho. He is a tireless researcher of chess History and has created fabulous classic writings on Lucena, Cessolis or Ruy López (coming soon). Also, he is a firm defender of the Egyptian origin of chess. As a composer his higher achievement has been the 11th position in the 2nd WCCT.

At the time of judgement, I have took into consideration mainly the following indicators: economy of means, flow of play, tactics-sacrifices and the presence/absence of additional themes as logical/thematic tries, reciprocal zugzwang positions, batteries, forks, etc. As a result, I consider the level of the tourney very good, plenty of original and fresh ideas.

In the section of flaws, predecessors and anticipations, the following remarks can be pointed out:

- No. 1 (h5/g1): Identical play after 4th black move to R. Staudte, 2003 (HHdbV#11721).
- No. 2 (c6/e5): Identical play after 10th black move to E. Iriarte, 2009 (HHdbV#5508).
- No. 3 (g8/d5): Identical play after 4th black move to V. Tarasiuk, 2015 (HHdbV#297).
- No. 6 (g2/f8): Anticipated by M. Zinar, 2011 (HHdbV#3360).
- No. 7 (h5/f3): Partially anticipated by W. Andreis, 2014 (HHdbV#1158).
- No. 8 (c5/c8): Dual 4.Kxa6.
- No. 9 (g2/e4): Duals 10.Kf3 or 12.Kf3.
- No. 22 (a4/b8): Final play as E. Pogosyants, 1983 (HHdbV#31286).
- No. 36 (f2/h2): Dual 4.Kg3.
- No. 56 (e8/h8): Duals 5.Kxe7, 6. Kxe7, 9.f6 or 10.Nxf5.

According to my taste, the following studies have not been selected in the award but they would get very probably success in another tourney: Nos. 4 (a8/d4), 10 (g2/e2), 18 (c1/c7), 19 (b3/b6), 37 (d4/a4), 45 (f4/e1), 51 (e1/e5) and 52 (h3/g5).

I have awarded 21 compositions that I hope they are liked by the jubilee. Apart from that, one of them also will receive a special book prize of the well-known "*The incunabulum by Lucena*", the oldest preserved book on modern chess, as the most pleasing to Joaquín Pérez de Arriaga, independently of its quality or place in the verdict.

Finally, I do not want to miss the opportunity to dedicate a composition to Joaquín's 85th anniversary which was the last November 9th. This is a twin study which appears as *hors concours* in the end of the award.

This provisional award will be published in *Problemas* (January 2018) and is now open for any commentaries during a three-month confirmation period. The final award will be communicated to all participants.







It seems that advanced wPs are enough advantage to win but, the most surprising is that it can only be possible after a spectacular Q-sac in the right time, once bK occupies an unfavourable square where the reciprocal zugzwang works in favour of white. In the original position there was not a g5 pawn but it is necessary to avoid a dualistic solution.
