The works I aspired to honors was checked for sound and anticipation. I sent the unsound ones to the relevant authors.


I would like to thank all the authors for their studies and for their congratulations on my anniversary. The unawarded studies may be scored in other tourneys if the authors send them there.



Successful correction of the author's study from Studistica 2000. At the beginning, it is necessary to choose whether the rook or the knight will cover check on f6. Black must act vigorously because his king does not feel comfortable. He will also help to minor promotion to knight and the sacrifice of both rooks! By that black will play their queen, but white

will also counter the sacrifice of his rook with hopes for stalemates with the pin of one or the other knight! Black only avoids it at the cost of losing a queen. However, the game does not end there - there is a nice positional draw also with the third stalemate this time without a pin. Very valuable work with saturated content.



The king is hiding on the base rank, but the black is still threatening. Beautiful 7th move white turns the battery into a queen to battery to the king - the bishop goes to the double-attacked square, but the white does not cover it! In addition, it abolishes the coverage of its rook, which white loses in as well as the bishop. The pin alternates the pin and the white in the 13th move again creates the battery on the same diagonal as in the 7th move. The black continues to attack 13.... $Rd1+!$ and 14.... $Nc1!$ White reacts with a chess battery 15. $Rd2+!$ and the study culminates in the draw end of two pawns against the rook. Excellent composition performance!

Black counteracts mate threats - the game will be split into 2 echo lines according to unexpected black queen moves to uncovered squares d3 resp. e4. White stalemate lures always overcomes the multiple promotion of pawns to the rook, to eventually repel the mate threats. The content required an economic tax - adding 3 statistic pieces, including a white rook on g1, as well as a brute capture on d8 - otherwise it would be a prize.
