COMMENTS ON THE NINTH USSR TEAM TOURNEY.

By: V. Neidze, Tbilisi.

Precise formulation of the set theme is very important in theme tournaments. Otherwise it is difficult to achieve consensus between judge and participants and thus assure the success of the competition.

The 9th USSR Team Tournament was remarkable for the fact that the themes were not set by the judges, thus causing extra problems for them.

I found this particularly when judging the second study board, where I felt the set theme was too broad, allowing too free an interpretation.

The themes were as follows:

1st Theme: The finale should contain an extraneous piece as the result of a promotion during play, e.g. a second Q, 3rd R or S, or a second B on the same colour square. Win or draw.

2nd. Theme: The same counterplay by B1 appears at different stages of the solution. Win or draw.

The organisers proposed that the studies should be evaluated by the 15-point system, a rather formal system. Apparently, points should be awarded as follows: 1-6 poor, 7-9 average, 10-12 good, 13-15 outstanding (incidentally, the tourney rules stated that a study placed first should automatically get 15 points). As there was no general agreement among the judges for each genre (the tourney included problems as well as studies), each judge had to rely on his own conscious and subconscious scale of values in applying the 15-point system.


My award did not provoke any comment from the competitors, except in the case of Kovalenko's study (1st Theme, 15th place, 9 points), which at the end played nearly the decisive role in determining the tourney winner. Some critics said that the study should have been awarded less than 4 points. However I felt that the study did not deserve to be so heavily penalised compared to studies placed near to it and which were not much superior to this ordinary study. The "drama" lay in the fact that, after the scores had been totted up and the results became final, an anticipation of the study was found.

Judge: V. Neidze, whom I wish to thank for making all the positions available for publication in *EG (AJR)*. The award does not appear to have been published in full (ie, with the positions), but selected positions have appeared in *Shakmaty vSSSR* (v. 76), in 64 (vi. 76), and the *Bulletin of the Central Chess Club of USSR* (vii. 76), this latter giving all the names of the winners. The themes were originally set out in an issue of 64. (Who coordinates this distribution of publication function?!) The Russian Federation first team just pipped Moscow for first place, and a long way behind were Moldavia, Belorussia, Leningrad, Ukraine, Georgia, Uzbekistan, Azerbaijan, Lithuania, Kazakhstan, Russian Federation (2), and Kirgizia. Studies formed one of 6 sections.


