Study No.153 was published in the magazine again under No.168. Unfortunately, study 154. P. Arrestov & D. Keith has a dual 4.Bh8!? Rd5 5.Nxd2! Rd8 6.Bg7 Rxd2+- EGTB. The final award is as follows.



3rd Prize Alexander Zhukov & Árpád Rusz & Pavel Arrestov (no. 172) (Russia – Romania)


1.Bc6! Qa7 2.Ra5+ Kb2 3.c5 Kc3 4.Ke2! Kb4 5.Kd3! Kxa5 6.Kc4! Qxc5+ 7.Kxc5 Ba7+ 8.Kc4!= [8.Kd5? Kb4–+] White figures immediately limit the mobility of the bQ, and their wK succeeds at the last moment to replace the deceased wr in a position of super-economical domination! But, in the opinion of the judge, there is very little paradox, which is characteristic for the studies of A. Zhukov.

Rxa4 3.Kb3 Bd7 4.Bc6! Rd4 [4...Bxc6 5.Rxc6 Saavedra's double attack symmetric relatively large diagonal! 5...Rxa5 6.Rc1#] 5.Kc3! Rd1 6.Kc2 Bg4
7.Rf4 Rd6 The pawn a4 disappeared from the board, and a mate is possible **8.Ra4#** Ambitious author's idea, unfortunately, required a large number of non-playing technical units.

And in this study there are also technical units.

Qg3! 6.Be5 Qc3! 7.Bxc3= stalemate, 5.Bxh2= stalemate] **5...Qg3 6.Nf4! Qg6!** [6...Qxh4 7.Bc7+ Ke7 8.Ng6++- and 6...Ke7 7.Nd5++- a forks] **7.Bc7+!** [7.Nxg6? = stalemate] **7...Ke7 8.Nxg6++-** White overcame numerous stalemate traps and did not give the bQ the chance to fight.

Bxb8 4.Rxb8 Nc5+ 5.Kb5 Nxd3+ 6.Kc4 Nf4 7.Rb3+ Ka4** [after 7...Ka2 accurate white game 8.Rd3! Ra5 9.Rd2+! (9.Rxd4? Ra4+-+) 9...Ka3 10.Kxd4!=] **8.Ra3+!** [8.Rd3? Rb5! (8...Rd8? 9.Rd2! (9.Rxd4? Rc8#; 9.Rd1? Rc8+ 10.Kxd4 Rd8+-+)) 9.Rxd4 Rb4+ and forks after 10.Kc3 Ne2++ or 10.Kc5 Ne6+-+] **8...Kxa3=** stalemate. And here the elegant stalemate ending with false try, a mat, a fork looks much better than a simple introduction.
