First of all, I would like to thank all participants very much for their entries! The realization of the tournament was a rather spontaneous idea, so that there were only 40 days between the publication of the announcement and the deadline for entries. Nevertheless, the tournament director IM Maximilian Berchtenbreiter (many thanks also to him!) received 28 studies from 10 countries. Study composers from Denmark, France, Germany, Israel, the Netherlands, Poland, Russia, Slovakia, Spain and Ukraine participated in the competition.

I would like to emphasize that as a judge I more or less completely disregarded the usual evaluation criteria in the industry and relied almost exclusively on my aesthetic sensibilities as a practitioner.


Unfortunately, one of the studies was obviously a first attempt at chess composition, and so it had some inaccuracies.

The solution to this study is remarkably long and complex, I found it hard to believe at first that the whole construct was viable at all. But: it is. And it's pretty to boot. I thought it was a bit of a pity that the queen on a7 "dies" without having made a single move.
